Phillipe Amouyel, MD PhD, is Professor of Public Health at the Lille University Hospital (France). He leads a large academic research unit working on public health and molecular epidemiology of ageing diseases. Part of his research, devoted to the study of determinants, mainly genetic of Alzheimer's disease (AD), has resulted in his discovery of several new susceptibility genes for AD. From 2002 to 2011, he also headed Institut Pasteur de Lille, a private non-profit foundation. Since 2008, he has been the CEO of the Fondation Plan Alzheimer, a French non-profit dedicated to supporting innovative, cutting-edge research for AD and related disorders. In addition, he chairs the EU Joint Programme on Neurodegenerative Disease Research (JPND), a 30 country initiative aimed at tackling the challenge of neurodegenerative diseases, in particular AD.

She also has experience as Technical Officer in the National Institute of Public Administration, Argentina, in the General Directorate of Training.

She has worked in Equatorial Guinea as Consultant, Expert and Chief Technical Adviser for EQG / DTCD / UNDP projects, and on the Modernization of Public Administration and Management, Ministry of Función Pública, National School of Public Administration (ENAP). She has worked in Mozambique as a Consultant for Project DTCD / UNDP / Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Meera Pattabiraman



Mrs. Meera Pattabiraman, a post graduate in business administration, entered the field of social work after she lost her father to Alzheimer's disease. She has been associated with Alzheimer's and Related Disorders Society of India (ARDSI) for twenty years. As the founder secretary of the Trivandrum Chapter, she has work experience at all levels, as counsellor for carers and family members, in planning and setting up day care and residential care facilities for persons with dementia and has worked with governmental agencies for conducting short and long term training programmes. She moved to the national scene and served as Secretary General of the national office of ARDSI for 9 years and has been the chairperson of ARDSI since being elected in 2012. She was one of the authors of the Dementia India Report 2010. The pioneering Kerala State Initiative on Dementia (KSID) was conceived in collaboration with two different state institutions namely, Social Justice Department of Kerala and Kerala Social Security Mission and rolled out in the year 2014 under her Chairmanship. This is the first state private partnership for dementia care, diagnosis, training and awareness in India. She is part of the national think tank to develop better health care for elderly and has taken part in the national health policy meetings. She is the ADI Ambassador for Asia Pacific Region, member of The World Dementia Council and the Global Alliance for Women's Health.

Keynote Speaker Biography

Regina Shaw



Gina was born in Liverpool, England on the 26th April 1952. The first child, she was soon to have five brothers and sisters. Gina had some part-time jobs but as she grew older she knew that ultimately she wanted to be a nurse.

She left high school at sixteen and applied to a college where she did well and was encouraged to apply to a hospital. Her first job as a cadet nurse in a children's hospital was a dream come true. Gina travelled the path of promotion, eventually to the role of Night Sister and was then asked to join the team responsible for designing a new hospital. It was during this time that it became apparent that all was not well and Gina knew she could not continue in her role. A visit to the doctors confirmed that she had Alzheimer's disease. She picked herself up and joined a group where she was made co-chair and then chosen to front a campaign for the Alzheimer's Society as the face of the UK Dementia Friends programme. This was very successful and conveyed positive, upbeat message about Alzheimer's. This led to her being invited to take the message to Australia. This was quite a challenge as it involved persuading their government that Dementia Friends worked and was a worthwhile investment. She is proud of her achievements in Australia. Gina is an active campaigner and speaker as an Alzheimer's Society Ambassador.

Prof. Dr. Philip Scheltens



Dr Philip Scheltens studied at the VU University, Amsterdam, The Netherlands, gaining his MD in 1984 and PhD (Magnetic Resonance Imaging in Alzheimer's disease) in 1993.

He is Professor of Cognitive Neurology and Director of the Alzheimer Center at the VU University Medical Center in Amsterdam, as well as Honorary Professor of Neurology at University College London. From 2011–2015 he has been the scientific director of the Dutch Pearlstring Institute (PSI). In 2012 he initiated the national dementia plan in the Netherlands, called the "Deltaplan Dementie" and was appointed as vice-chair of the board in 2013. He is founder of, and has directed since 2000, the VUmc Alzheimer Center, which under his directorship produced to date over 54 PhD theses. He has authored more than 750 peer reviewed papers and more than 50 book chapters and co-edited several textbooks. His work is widely cited as evidenced by a current Hirsch factor of 91. In 2015 his first Dutch book entitled "het Alzheimer Mysterie" was published (Arbeiderspers), which entered the bestseller list in 2 weeks. He was elected member of the Royal Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2011 and was elected as member of the Board of Directors in 2015.

Keynote Speaker Biography

Kate Swaffer



Kate Swaffer is Chair, CEO and co-founder of Dementia Alliance International, a World Dementia Council member, a Board member of ADI and Chair of Alzheimer's Australia Dementia Advisory Committee.

She is a PhD student at the University of Wollongong and has a Master's of Science in Dementia Care. Kate is also living beyond a diagnosis of younger onset dementia. Human rights for dementia is a key focus for her. She featured in the Australian 100 Women of Influence (2016) list, and won the University of Wollongong Social Impact Alumni Award in 2016. She is also an author, humanitarian and activist for change in dementia care.

Dr. Adrienne Withall



Dr Adrienne Withall is a Senior Research Fellow within the School of Public Health and Community Medicine at UNSW Australia. She is a Chief Investigator of the INSPIRED Study of young onset dementia and Principal Investigator on current studies examining risk factors for young onset dementia, health outcomes of older cannabis users, and the ageing prisoner. Adrienne is a Board Member of the International Psychogeriatrics Association's Young Onset Dementia Shared Interest Group. She is passionate about improving care for young people with dementia and their supporters and reducing the risk of cognitive impairment in vulnerable groups.

Kunio Takami



Kunio Takami is president of Alzheimer's Association Japan.

He had worked for Kyoto Prefecture Government and had been a carer for his mother with dementia for eight years. He is a founding member of Alzheimer's Association Japan and has been the president for 37 years since its establishment. He is a pioneer of the movement of family carers of people with dementia and has been working to build the society where people with dementia and their families can live in safety and in peace.

He was awarded by the Social Devotion Foundation for his contribution in 2010. His book "The Bond is Hope" has been encouraging people with dementia and their carers since it was published in 2011.

Marc Wortmann



Marc Wortmann is Executive Director of Alzheimer's Disease International (ADI).

Marc studied Law and Art in the city of Utrecht in the Netherlands and was an entrepreneur in retail for 15 years. During this time Marc was a member of the Parliament of the Province of Utrecht and worked closely with various charities and voluntary organisations. He became Executive Director of Alzheimer Nederland in 2000. From 2002 to 2005 he chaired the Dutch Fundraising Association and was Vice-President of the European Fundraising Association from 2004 to 2007. Marc became Executive Director of ADI in 2006.

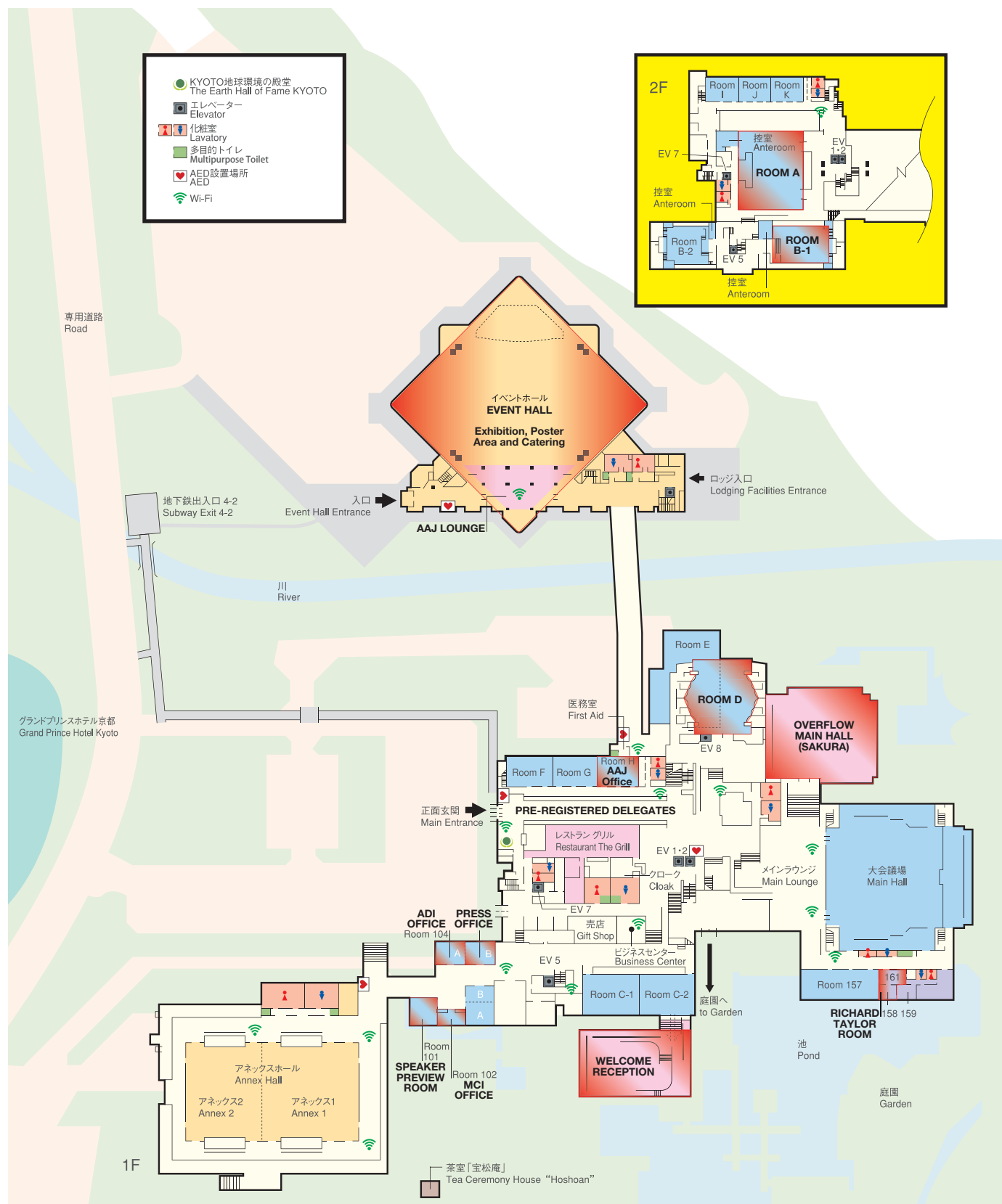

Travel Information

Train (Shinkansen)

Located on the main Shinkansen (Bullet Train) line, Kyoto is directly accessible from Narita (Tokyo), Haneda (Tokyo), Centrair (Nagoya) and Kansai (Osaka) International Airports.

Tokyo and Kyoto are connected with each other by the JR Tokaido Shinkansen. Nozomi trains are the fastest train service running on the Tokaido/Sanyo Shinkansen lines in Japan and require about 140 minutes to reach Kyoto from Tokyo. Hikari trains, a high-speed train service running on the Tokaido and Sanyo Shinkansen “bullet train” lines take around 160 minutes and Kodama trains which stop at all stations take around 4 hours.

Bus

Kyoto has a dense bus network with direct bus lines from Kyoto Station and/or the city centre around Shijo-dori (4th Avenue) and Kawaramachi-dori (Kawaramachi Street) to most major sights.

For central Kyoto, the green Kyoto City Bus buses are the most frequent and popular. The red buses by Kyoto Bus are the second most prominent and tend to be convenient to access sights in more outlying areas of the city. There is a flat rate of ¥230 per ride. Outside the flat fare zone, the fare increases with the distance.

Subway

There are two subway lines in Kyoto, the Karasuma Line which runs from south to north along Karasuma-dori (Karasuma Street) and stops at JR Kyoto Station, and the newer Tozai Line which runs from east to west and crosses the Karasuma Line at the intersection of Karasuma-dori and Oike-dori. The station of the KICC is “Kokusaikaikan Station”. Instructions for the machines are available in English. The subway cars feature announcements in English and there are electronic signs displaying the names of the next stop in English above the doors. Tickets can be bought in cash.

Taxi

Kyoto is the Japanese city with the highest concentration of taxis, especially in the city centre. The rate starts around ¥650 for the first two kilometres and increases by ¥80 for every additional 300–400 meters travelled. To call a taxi please dial +81 75 757 6212
