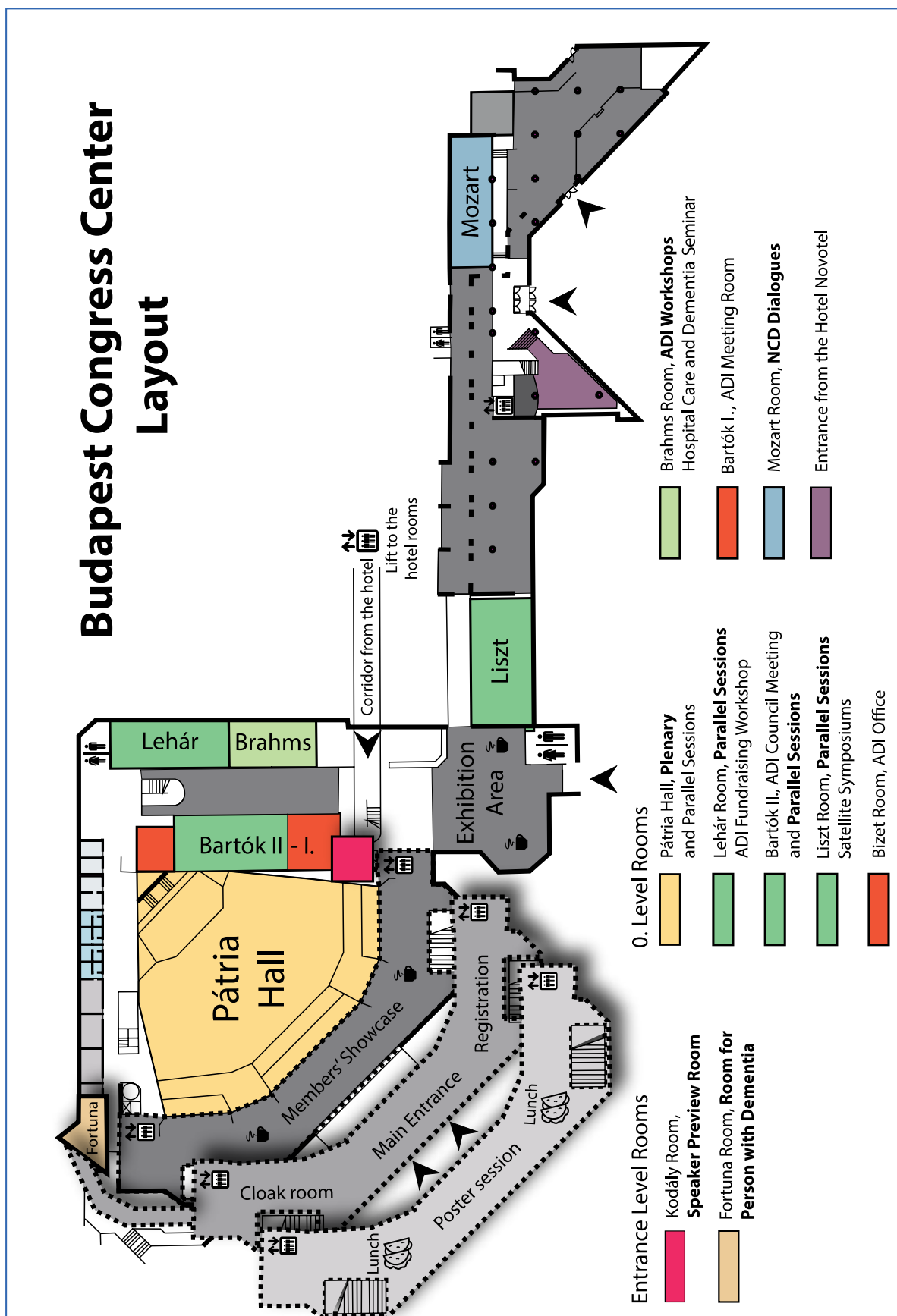

### Language

The official language spoken in Hungary is Hungarian. In the hotels, restaurants and touristic areas people speak English.

### Currency

The Hungarian currency is the forint (Ft). All visitors are advised to exchange currency only at accredited places. The majority of banks have 24-hour ATM's some of which can also exchange foreign currency. Some places and taxis will accept payment in Euros, however this is at the discretion of the venue.

### Taxes

In most cases standard Value Added Tax (VAT) in 2016 is payable at a rate of 27%. There is a reduced rate of 18%, relating to hotels and basic food and a 5% rate that relates mainly to products and services such as books and medicines.

## Keynote Speaker Biographies

### Marco Blom



Marco Blom is the Scientific Director of Alzheimer Nederland.

Marco is a psychogerontologist and since 1987 has been involved in organisations and projects on dementia. He started his career at a Community Mental Health Centre in The Hague and was in 1991 appointed at the National Institute of Care and Welfare (now called Vilans) in Utrecht. In March 1997 he joined Alzheimer Nederland. He was involved in the development of the Alzheimer Cafes, the Alzheimer Research Centers and now leads the scientific program of Alzheimer Nederland. Since 2011 he has been appointed as a researcher at the Free University (Amsterdam) in a study on the (cost) effectiveness of internet interventions for family caregivers of people with dementia. He is a board member of the Deltaplan Dementie (national program on dementia) and member of the editorial board of a Netherlands Journal of Psychogeriatrics, called Denkbeeld.

### Prof. Carol Brayne



Carol Brayne is a Professor of Public Health Medicine in the Department of Public Health and Primary Care in the University of Cambridge.

She is a medically qualified epidemiologist and public health academic. She graduated in medicine from the Royal Free Hospital School of Medicine, University of London and went on to train in general medicine. After gaining membership she moved on to training in epidemiology with a Training Fellowship with the Medical Research Council. The research area for this Fellowship was ageing and dementia.

Since the mid eighties her main research area has been longitudinal studies of older people following changes over time in cognition, dementia natural history and associated features with a public health perspective. She is lead principal investigator in the group of MRC CFA Studies which have informed and will continue to inform national policy and scientific understanding of dementia in whole populations. She is Director of the Cambridge Institute of Public Health at the University of Cambridge and has played a lead role in teaching and training in epidemiology and public health at Cambridge University.

She is a Fellow of the British Academy of Medical Sciences.



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## Prof. Henry Brodaty

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Henry Brodaty is an academic - Scientia Professor of Ageing and Mental Health, Director of the Dementia Collaborative Research Centre and Co-Director of the Centre for Healthy Brain Ageing at the University of New South Wales; and a clinician – consultant psychogeriatrician and Head of the Memory Disorders Clinic in the Aged Care Psychiatry Service at Prince of Wales Hospital in Sydney.

As immediate past-president of the International Psychogeriatric Association and as former chairman of Alzheimer's Disease International, and former president of Alzheimer's Australia and Alzheimer's Australia (NSW), he has been at the forefront of consumer and professional groups devoted to improving the mental health of older people in particular those with dementia and their families. In Australia, he is a member of several key State and National Committees in concerned with dementia and mental health in older people.

Professor Brodaty has published over 400 refereed articles, ten books and many book chapters and reports. He has received many national and international awards for research and community work.

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## Dr. Doug Brown

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Dr. Doug Brown is the Director of Research and Development at the Alzheimer's Society.

He completed his PhD at Cambridge on HIV research and spent three years as a post-doctoral fellow at the Medical Research Council's National Institute for Medical Research working on malaria, before taking up a post at the Multiple Sclerosis Society to lead the biomedical research programme.

After five years at the MS Society he moved to the Alzheimer's Society to lead the Research and Development programme. Increasing investment in research is a key goal of the Alzheimer's Society which aims to invest more than £10 million a year in dementia research by 2017, and has committed to spending at least £100m over the next decade. The research programme will continue to provide a vehicle for funding across the spectrum of dementia research, into the cause, cure, care and prevention of dementia, and will focus on translating and implementing research findings for ultimate benefit of people affected by dementia.

Doug is also a Trustee of the Association of Medical Research Charities.

## Keynote Speaker Biographies

### Dr. Maria Carrillo



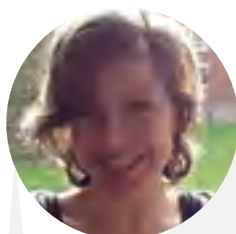
Maria Carrillo, Ph.D., is Chief Science Officer, Medical and Scientific Relations, at the Alzheimer's Association. Dr. Carrillo has a wide range of responsibilities, including oversight of the Association's grantmaking process and communication of scientific findings within and outside of the organisation. Dr. Carrillo directly manages several Alzheimer's Association initiatives, including the Research Roundtable, the World-Wide Alzheimer's Disease Neuroimaging Initiative, and the Global Alzheimer's Association Interactive Network. She is co-author of the National Institute on Aging-Alzheimer's Association revised criteria for the diagnosis of Alzheimer's, and the Appropriate use Criteria for Amyloid Imaging. She is on the Advisory Committee for the World Health Organization Dementia Setting Priorities & Portfolio Analysis.

### Dr. Tarun Dua



Dr. Dua is working as a Coordinator in the World Health Organization Headquarters in the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse. She is the focal point for neurological disorders in the department. She leads the work on dementia including the WHO/ADI report on dementia in 2012 "Dementia: a public health priority", organisation of the First WHO Ministerial Conference on Global Action Against Dementia, March 2015 and the development of the Global Dementia Observatory. She has been involved in the development of the mhGAP Guidelines on mental, neurological and substance use disorders (including dementia) and the latest edition of Disease Control Priorities in Developing Countries' volume on mental, neurological and substance use disorders (including dementia).

### Dr. Simone R. de Bruin



Dr. Simone R. de Bruin is a senior researcher at the Dutch National Institute for Public Health and the Environment (RIVM), Centre for Nutrition, Prevention, and Health Services. In 2009, she obtained her PhD-degree at Wageningen University, the Netherlands. Her PhD research was on exploring the potential health benefits of adult day services at green care farms for people with dementia. In her current position, she is leading several research projects on the organisation and quality of long-term care. Research topics include integrated care for older people, health care innovations for people with dementia (including green care farms), and early detection of problems and risks in older people. She is project manager of the SUSTAIN-project, a European wide project on integrated care financed under Horizon 2020, the Framework Programme for Research and Innovation (2014-2020) from the European Union.

### Dennis Frost



Dennis Frost from Australia, has had a variety of careers, beginning with 10 years as a Petroleum Exploration Geophysicist, a Secondary School teacher (Maths and Science) and finally 20 years part time, teaching IT and being an IT Support Engineer within TAFE as well as running his own IT support business. At age 59 after 18 months of pursuing a diagnosis he was diagnosed with semantic Frontotemporal Dementia. Since that time he has had an older sister who has been diagnosed with a Dementia and has been actively involved in a local Dementia Friendly Community project. About 18 months ago he was elected Chair of the Kiama Dementia Advisory Group which is central to the project. Concurrent to that he helped form a local peer support group for people with dementia.





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## Dr. Serge Gauthier

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Medical studies at Université de Montréal, Neurology training at McGill University, Research Fellowship at Prof. Theodore L. Sourkes laboratory, Allen Memorial Institute, Montreal. Clinical investigator and staff neurologist at the Montreal Neurological Hospital and Institute (1976-1986), Director of the McGill Centre for Studies in Aging (1986-1996), Senior Scientist of the CIHR-Rx&D program (1997-2007). Currently Professor in the Departments of Neurology & Neurosurgery, Psychiatry, Medicine, at McGill University, and Director of the Alzheimer Disease and Related Disorders Research Unit of the McGill Center for Studies in Aging, Douglas Hospital.

Contributions to research include design and implementation of randomized clinical trials in order to establish the safety and efficacy of cholinesterase inhibitors, muscarinic agonists, and agents possibly modifying progression for Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia. Special interests include consensus approach to the management of dementia in different stages, the ethics of research involving persons with dementia, and primary prevention strategies against cognitive decline and dementia.

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## Luis Miguel F. Gutiérrez Robledo MD, PhD

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Dr. Gutiérrez is a Mexican scholar trained in France on geriatric medicine and the biology of aging; he currently serves as Director General of the National Institute of Geriatrics, at the National Institutes of Health in Mexico. He serves as the expert lead of the Mexican Alzheimer's disease action plan. His international experience and high expertise have made him a highly respected expert in the field of Public Health and Aging. He has consulted through PAHO and WHO, and he has lectured as well in the European Academy for the Medicine of Ageing and The Latin American Academy for the Medicine of Aging; which he contributed to creating in 2001. Founder in 1989 of the first Department of Geriatric Medicine at the National Institutes of Health in Mexico; in 2008 he was appointed as the founder Director General of the National Institute of Geriatrics.

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## Prof. Tobias Hartmann

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The German Institute for Dementia Prevention, led by Prof. Dr. rer. nat. Tobias Hartmann, focusses on the development of innovative preventive approaches to Alzheimer's disease and their practical implementation.

The institute's research spans a wide array of activities, they are best known for their long-standing scientific contribution on the role of lipid metabolic pathways and nutrition in AD pathogenesis and prevention. Previous work includes CSF amyloid biomarkers, statins/cholesterol, identification of Alzheimer's disease related molecular pathways and intracellular amyloid biology. Prof. Hartmann is currently Full Professor Experimental Neurology at Saarland University and Scientific Director at Deutsches Institut für Demenzprävention der Universität des Saarlandes. Prof. Hartmann has published over 120 articles on Alzheimer's disease.

## Keynote Speaker Biographies

### Prof. Christian Hölscher, PhD



Christian Holscher is Professor of Neuroscience at the department of Biomedical Sciences and Life Sciences at University of Lancaster, England. He did his first degree in Physiology at the University of Tübingen in Germany and continued his career in England, working at several universities such as Oxford University and the Open University. His research is focused on the development of novel drug treatments for Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease. He investigates the interaction between diabetes and neurodegeneration, which led him to discover the neuroprotective properties of incretin analogues which are currently on the market to treat type 2 diabetes. His research techniques include transgenic animal models of Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease to profile new drug candidates in preclinical studies. One of the drugs profiled by him is now in clinical trials in patients with Alzheimer's disease which is partly funded by the Alzheimer's Society UK and the Alzheimer's Drug Discovery Foundation. Further trials are in planning.

### Prof. János Kálmán



Chair of Department of Psychiatry (Faculty of Medicine, University of Szeged, Szeged, Hungary).

His main interest includes biological psychiatry, psychopharmacology, gerontopsychiatry with special focus on Alzheimer's and related neurocognitive disorders. He was the founder of the local memory clinic, and he was leading this unit for more than 15 years. During this period he directed and organised preclinical and clinical research associated with Alzheimer's Disease and other dementias. Since 2003 to 2014 he was the director of the Alzheimer's Research Laboratory, the one and only place devoted to preclinical dementia research in Hungary. He received his PhD degree in 1997 and his DSc degree from the Hungarian Academy of Sciences in 2008. He has published 8 book chapters and more than 160 scientific papers (over a 100 in English). He spent 3.5 years carrying out external research work (USA, Scotland, Germany). His main ongoing research grants are: EU FP7 NIL-VAD (2012-2017), TÁMOP 4.2.2. (2013-2016), NAP (2013-2017). He is the elected leader of the Hungarian Alzheimer's Association since 2009. Since 1990 Dr. Kálmán has been continuously involved in under and postgraduate teaching and organisation of the national Alzheimer's conferences. He is an active contributor in the development of national dementia protocols.

### Dr. István Kappéter



Dr. István Kappéter has been a special education, pedagogy and psychology teacher since 1995. He got his medical degree in 1962 and became a neurology specialist in 1966, a psychiatry specialist in 1968 and has been a psychotherapy specialist since 1984. He has been living with Lewy Body dementia since 1995 and Alzheimer's disease since 2005. He is a member of the Hungarian Alzheimer Society.



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## Prof. Peter Mittler

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Professor Peter Mittler, CBE, Ph.D.;  
Dementia Alliance International (Human Rights Adviser)

Emeritus Professor of Special Needs Education and Hon. Research Fellow, University of Manchester; formerly adviser in disability to UK government; UN consultant 1979-to date. Former President Inclusion International; Fellow of the International Association for the Scientific Study of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities.

Peter has been involved in the development of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities over a long period, initially representing people with intellectual disabilities at relevant UN meetings where they now speak for themselves. Since his own diagnosis of dementia in 2006, he has carried out a detailed study of the CRPD and has joined other self-advocates in demanding access to the CRPD for people with dementia who are legally entitled to it but have not been empowered to use it. This is about to change.

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## Tiia Ngandu, MD, PhD

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Tiia Ngandu, MD, PhD is currently working at the Chronic Disease Prevention Unit, National Institute for Health and Welfare, Helsinki, Finland as a senior researcher and team leader of the Dementia Prevention team. She is also affiliated to the Alzheimer's Disease Research Center, Karolinska Institutet, Stockholm, Sweden. She has completed her medical studies at the University of Kuopio, Finland, and her PhD in geriatric epidemiology at the Karolinska Institutet, Sweden.

Her major research interests are in the area of dementia epidemiology, particularly risk factors and prevention of Alzheimer's disease and cognitive impairment. She is involved in population-based studies investigating dementia risk factors, and she is the coordinator of the ongoing Finnish Geriatric Intervention Study to Prevent Cognitive Impairment and Disability (FINGER).

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## Prof. Martin Orrell

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Professor Martin Orrell, FRCPsych PhD is Director of the Institute of Mental Health, a partnership between the University of Nottingham and Nottinghamshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust.

Until February 2015 he was Professor of Ageing and Mental Health at University College London and Director of Research and Development at North East London Foundation Trust. He is a Visiting Professor at City University and Honorary Professor at the University of Liverpool. He is Chair of the Memory Services National Accreditation Panel (MSNAP) and a member of the Prime Ministers Challenge on Dementia Research Group.

He has been awarded 5 major dementia grants totalling £11 million on psychosocial interventions for dementia care and is co-applicant on a further £9 million. He has published over 200 academic papers. He is a Board member of both INTERDEM and the International Psychogeriatric Association. In 2014 he was elected President of the European Association of Geriatric Psychiatry. He is also Editor of the journal Aging & Mental Health.

## Keynote Speaker Biographies

### Prof. Martin Prince



Martin Prince is Professor of Epidemiological Psychiatry and Co-Director of the Centre for Global Mental Health at King's College London.

He trained in Psychiatry at the Maudsley Hospital and in Epidemiology at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.

His work is oriented to the salience of mental and neurological disorders to health and social policy in low and middle income countries (LMIC), with a focus on ageing and dementia. He has coordinated, since 1998 the 10/66 Dementia Research Group, a network of researchers, mainly from Lower and Middle Income Countries (LMIC) working together to promote more good research into dementia in those regions. The group has published 100 papers covering dementia prevalence, incidence, aetiology and impact and contributed to knowledge of public health aspects of ageing and chronic disease in LMIC.

He was co-author of the Dementia UK report that informed the UK Government's National Dementia Strategy. He lead the development of the widely reported ADI World Alzheimer Reports for 2009 (prevalence and numbers), 2010 (societal cost) and 2011 (early intervention), 2013 (long term care), 2014 (modifiable risk factors), 2015 (update on prevalence, incidence and cost) and was a leading contributor to the WHO World Dementia Report 2012. He was one of three editors for the 2007 Lancet Series on Global Mental Health, and is committed to further research and advocacy to support the call for action for improved coverage of evidence-based community treatments. He coordinated the development of the WHO Mental Health Gap Action Plan (mhGAP) clinical guidelines for dementia care by non-specialists in LMIC.

### Mary L. Radnofsky, Ph.D.



Doctorate in Education and Human Development from Vanderbilt University, Maîtrise de Lettres Modernes from the Université de Provence, France. Research and teaching in Qualitative and Quantitative Research Methods, Astronomy, French, English, and Interdisciplinary Curriculum Design at several institutions, including Georgetown University, University of Hawaii, and University of Maryland. Published in English and French as an ethnographer, evaluator, and educator on international projects.

Professor Radnofsky also founded The Socrates Institute, a non-profit organization using innovative methods to improve the quality of teaching and learning through problem-solving.

She has won numerous grants in the arts and sciences, and served as instructional designer at the Challenger Center for Space Science Education, librarian at the French Embassy in Liberia, communications director at Middlebury College French School, and host mother to a Japanese student in Hawaii. She has ghostwritten three books, and is currently an ambassador at the Smithsonian Museum of American History.

Dr. Radnofsky is a member of the Dementia Alliance International, the National Society of Arts & Letters, and a former Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society.



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## Dr. Steven Sabat

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Steven R. Sabat is Professor of Psychology at Georgetown University. He has received Georgetown College's Edward B. Bunn Award for Excellence in Teaching three times (1988, 1995, 2013), the Georgetown College Dean's Award for Excellence in Teaching (2003) and the College Academic Council's Award for Excellence in Teaching (2012).

For the past 34 years, he has studied the intact cognitive and social abilities of people with Alzheimer's disease in the moderate to severe stages, the persistence of selfhood, the subjective experience of having the disease, and how communication between persons diagnosed and their caregivers may be enhanced.

He has explored these issues in numerous scientific journal articles and book chapters, presentations at national and international conferences, in his book, *The Experience of Alzheimer's Disease: Life Through a Tangled Veil* (Blackwell, 2001) and in his co-edited book, *Dementia: Mind, Meaning, and the Person* (Oxford University Press, 2006).

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## John Sandblom

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John has lived in the state of Iowa in the United States all of his life. He attended the University of Iowa where he had a double major in sociology and psychology. He spent the largest part of his career as an advertising account executive and previously was one of the owners of a small business.

John was diagnosed with dementia at the age of 48 in 2007. Since diagnosis he has worked as an advocate at the local, state and federal levels in the US. John started an online support group solely for people with a dementia diagnosis several years ago. He is one of the founding members of Dementia Alliance International (DAI) founded January of 2014 and was an inaugural Co-Chair of the Board of Directors. He remains a member of that Board and currently serves as Treasurer as well. John lost his father to what is thought to be the same type of atypical Alzheimer's in 2010 that is now John's diagnosis (frontal variant Alzheimer's Disease).



## Keynote Speaker Biographies

### Dr. Jenny van der Steen



Jenny T. van der Steen, PhD Associate professor, epidemiologist at VU University Medical Center Amsterdam and Radboud University Medical Center, Nijmegen The Netherlands.

Jenny van der Steen has focused her work on end of life in older people, and in particular, palliative care for people with dementia and nursing home residents. She authored the EAPC white paper on palliative care in dementia with recommendations for practice, policy, and research. She is an editor of Palliative Medicine. Her work is funded by career awards from the Netherlands Organisation for Scientific Research. Collaboration with researchers in the UK, Italy, Flanders, US, Canada, Japan, Israel and other countries has been part of cross-national work. Quality of life and dying, symptom burden, and families' satisfaction with care are the main outcomes of her studies. Other work focuses on methodological issues such as research design and properties of measurement instruments, mortality risk scores, spiritual care, family counselling, treatment and its effectiveness, and infectious diseases in nursing home residents.

### Dr. Éva Vető



Geological studies at Eötvös University, Budapest. She has been working the mineral industry and the Hungarian Geological Survey. She was the chairman of an international research project in the first half of the ninties. Retired in 1996. In the first ten years of her retirement she continued to make microscopy and field work. During the last twenty years she, as a volunteer, serves in the hospital chaplaincy of the Budapest – Esztergom diocese. She is playing tennis and participates in veteran championships.

	This workshop will explore the positives of a human rights based approach to improving the quality of life of people with dementia. An important element of such a strategy could be taking advantage of the opportunities for people living with dementia created by the United Nations treaties on Human Rights, especially the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) which has been ratified by the European Union and 163 countries. The Convention offers a regular process of reviewing the position of people with disabilities by the UN country by country. The Convention could be used in the development of new national dementia strategies at regional and national levels and to advocate for improvements in dementia care and services to reflect its General Principles and Articles. This is a strategy supported by the ADI Board in partnership with Dementia Alliance International.

## NCD Dialogues

Non-communicable diseases (NCDs), which include cardiovascular disease, chronic respiratory disease, diabetes and cancer in addition to dementia, are now widely recognised as a global health and development emergency. NCDs are a leading cause of preventable mortality; of 38 million NCD deaths annually, more than 40% occur in people under 70 years of age. Without action, NCDs will cost the global economy \$47 trillion from 2011 to 2030.

### Session 1

#### End of Life Care for People with Dementia and NCDs – Getting it Right

**Friday 22 April, 14:00 – 15:30, Mozart Room**

Non-communicable diseases (NCDs) are typically chronic conditions which require particular care towards the end of life. The World Health Organization estimates that 40 million people are in need of palliative care each year – but that 86% do not receive it. The greatest gaps can be observed in developing country settings. Once implemented, it is imperative that end of life care services are holistic, extending far beyond physical treatment. The need for proper psychological and spiritual support for the person at the centre of the care, and for those around them, cannot be underestimated.

##### Objectives:

- To examine the multiple facets of end of life care through a holistic lens
- To emphasise the need to empower people living with dementia and NCDs, and their carers, to shape end of life care
- To promote the significance of the adoption of the 67th World Health Assembly Resolution on Palliative Care and explore policy options to improve palliation worldwide

### Session 2

#### Good for the Heart, Good for the Brain: Prevention and Early Diagnosis for Dementia and NCDs

**Friday 22 April, 17:15 - 18:45, Mozart Room**

Dementia and non-communicable diseases (NCDs) are collectively driven by the same shared risk factors and social determinants. Evidence for how tobacco use, physical inactivity, poor diet and alcohol consumption is growing ever stronger, supporting the need to incorporate mental and neurological health into the global NCD response. Workplace wellness schemes offer one particular example for effective prevention of NCDs, while timely diagnosis can have a dramatic impact on outcomes. Furthermore, social determinants dramatically influence the burden of NCDs, and must be addressed as part of a comprehensive response.

##### Objectives:

- To examine the evidence for shared risk factors and social determinants across dementia and other NCDs, implications for co-morbidities

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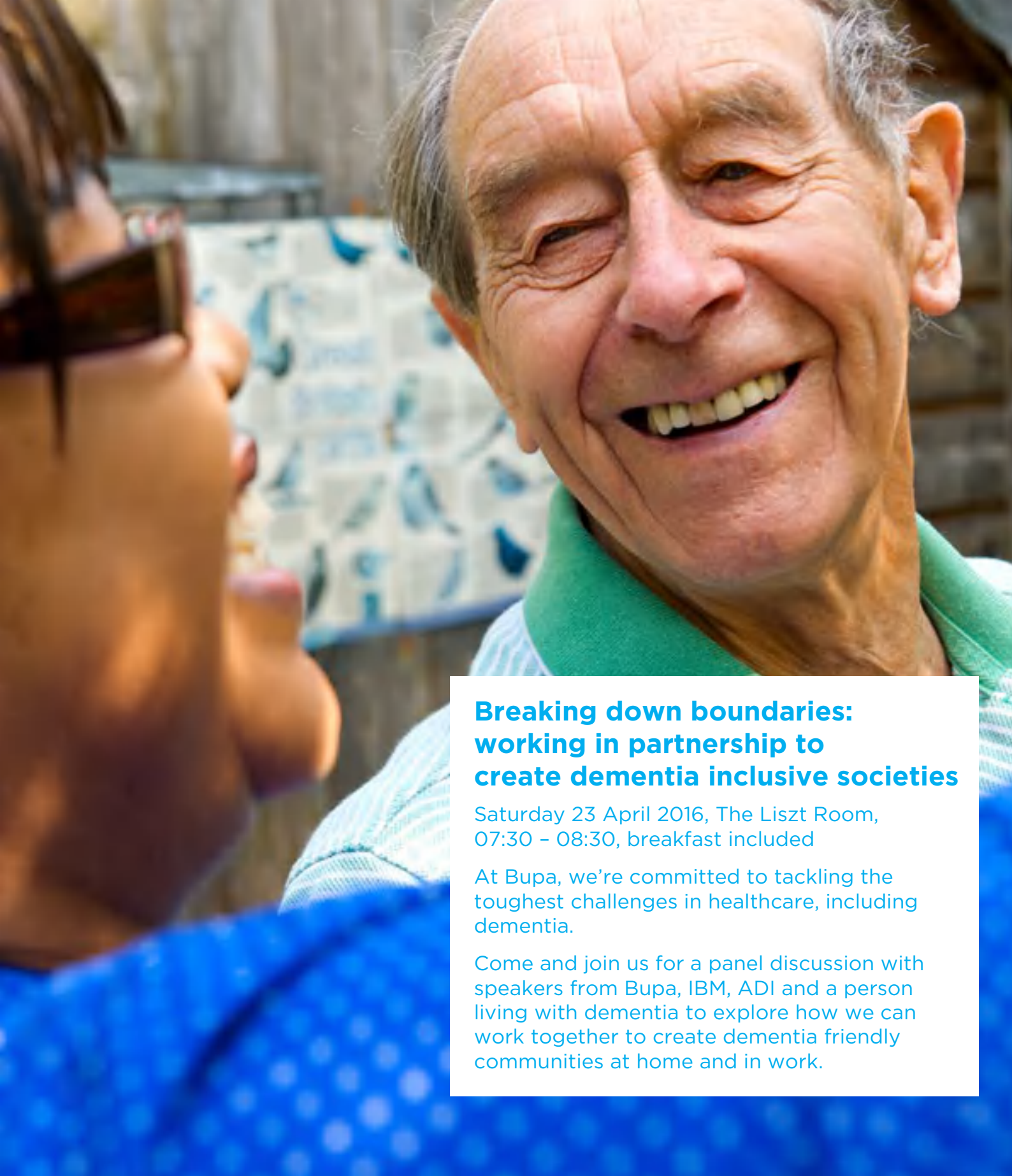
